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Synopsis



Roger Lancelyn Green (1918-1987) was a biographer of children’s writers and a reteller of myths, legends and fairy tales. He was a member of the Oxford literary group the Inklings, along with J. R. R. Tolkien and C. S. Lewis. Roger was born in Norwich, England. He studied under C.S. Lewis at Oxford where he obtained a B.A. Degree. His fantasy novel, *The Land of the Lord High Tiger* has been compared to C.S. Lewis's Narnia books.
